A powerful exploration of what it means to be human: Koffler Centre of the Arts announces the 2019 Vine Awards Shortlist

Honouring the best Canadian Jewish literature in five categories, each with a prize of \$10,000

Toronto, ON, September 26, 2019 – The Koffler Centre of the Arts is proud to announce the shortlist for the 2019 <u>Vine Awards for Canadian Jewish Literature</u>. Winners will be announced on October 23 at an Award Luncheon at the Windsor Arms Hotel, Toronto.

The Vine Awards honour both the best Canadian Jewish writers and Canadian authors who deal with Jewish subjects in five categories; Fiction, Non-Fiction, Poetry, History and Children's/Young Adult literature; each with a prize of **\$10,000**. The 2019 Jury – poet **Ayesha Chatterjee**, children's author **Melanie J. Fishbane**, and author **Eric Beck Rubin** – reviewed 84 entries.

"This year's Vine Awards shortlist embodies the diversity of Canadian Jewish writing, characterized by the universal themes of home, family, and finding a place to belong," said 2019 Juror, Melanie J. Fishbane. "These authors dive deep into generational trauma, challenge popular historical narratives, and ask the difficult questions about not only what it means to be Jewish, but to be human."

"It was an absolute pleasure to read the submissions for the 2019 Vine Awards for Canadian-Jewish Literature. The sheer range of deeply compelling voices was extraordinary," said 2019 Juror Ayesha Chatterjee. "Each of these books, regardless of category, was a powerful exploration of what it means to be human. Survival, belonging, identity, place: these were recurring themes, tackled with intelligence, courage, deep eloquence. The best books are those that change the reader in some way, open them up to new worlds and new ways of thinking. The submissions for this year's awards did exactly that."
